Dear all.

A colleague tells a good story, albeit of another college and probably another era.

Years ago, one bright December morning, he sat waiting for the last interview candidate of the day. Now you know that admissions interviews are curious and anxious things. Perhaps, though, you do not know that interviews upset the dons, too. There are the obvious worries about making the right decision and asking the best sort of questions. But there is also something else going on. Once these comfortably ageing dons were the ones sitting on the edge of the chair all bright-eyed and bushy-tailed, banging on about Luther and Calvin; once they wore the smart and slightly unfamiliar suit. Dons don't wear suits very much; they have comfy jumpers and ties with gravy stains. They don't sit on the edge of chairs; they don't look pert or poised. It is as if the door bursts open and an old dog lying by the fire suddenly finds he is sharing the room with puppies that make a noise and bang into the furniture, spill the sherry and have fights on the floor.



That day, though, the man that came through the door was more donnish than the dons. He had a jumper, he leaned back in his chair and stretched his legs out, he smiled, and he seemed to think the whole set up was rather amusing. He was in, he knew it, the dons knew it and there were only the formalities to go through, so a last question for politeness' sake: 'Is there anything you want to ask us?' He smiled that lazy smile again.

'No,' he said and then - in sheer bravado - 'what you see is what you get'!

But was the candidate right? What if what you see is not what you get? Does not faith teach that there is another world and it is in this one? That here on a cold Sunday night in the dog days of mid-January, when it's not always easy to be brave and beautiful, even here the Kingdom of God is at hand.

Let me say this. We see glory, we find hope, not out there in some activity we have yet to master, but in a human life, in Christ's life and in ours. Religion is not a call to do something; it is a call to be something. Religion is all about living a human life and finding in it the very presence of God. That is the great good news, that even here in early 2025, even in your lives and mine, there is grace and glory.
