















Dear all,

I've just dropped my daughter off in Durham for her first term there reading music. She has been allocated a room in a small, self-contained building affectionately called *The Wendy House*.

Maybe you know that nomenclature stems from the house built - for her protection - around Wendy Darling in JM Barrie's play *Peter Pan*, or *The Boy who wouldn't Grow up*. But as Katherine Rundell, Oxford academic and author of *Impossible Creatures*, observes: 'All children grow up: those who write for children need, therefore, to write fiction that will speak to them both now and in their future'.

Well, your future has arrived, and here you are. In part, my job is to help provide sufficient scaffolding for you to survive and thrive as students ... to grow and flourish during your



time with us. To that end, the humane and uplifting theme for Choral Evensong this term is STORYBOOKS. A number of writers, academics and clergy will consider the craft of children's literature, playing with ideas of story, narrative and illustration, thereby establishing common ground between us - irrespective of belief or background - but also offering a reassuring, nostalgic bridge back to your formative years and

a hopeful one forward to all your experiences at university. Maybe you know Frank Cottrell Boyce's fascinating commentary on the neuroscience involved in bedtime reading and beyond. From *Room on the Broom* to *The Tiger who came to Tea*, I am sure it's right that we never really outgrow the best of these stories. They still have their 'teachable moments', all the more so when read with the eye of faith.

Katherine Rundell again: children's books are 'engines of wonder', promoting - like religions at their best - a vision of the world not only as it is, but as it might be. If, as an adult, you become unmoored, astray or at sea, children's literature stands waiting, with its distilled vision of that which can never be lost.
